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TIME'S UP: the old GED TEST Phases Out December 31

Our **GED** classes here at Clatsop are seeing an influx of students rushing to finish their GED tests before the **2o14** series goes into effect. We are looking at adding test sessions beyond the **December 6 final date** now in place, but we have yet to receive authorization to do so. There are several worrisome factors about the new tests:

- the math requirements will increase significantly next year
- students will need computer and keyboarding skills
- the price is going up
- students will need content knowledge, which is not a bad thing, but problematic for instructors running multi-level classes with diverse needs

An article from **CNN Money** discusses the "hottest" current job skill – **bilingualism.** The growth in good-paying jobs for people who have fluency in another language is expected to **increase markedly** over the next decade. Sometimes this skill is needed in conjunction with other job skills (technical and otherwise) and sometimes as a stand-alone for translations. The Utility of Command Verbs with ESL Students

The answer to last month's question: "What is the shortest English language sentence?" was 'Go.'
The winner also suggested 'Be,' one that I didn't think of, but which also fits the bill. Command verbs imply the subject (you) and are just like the infinitive (the 'to' form of a verb). Good ESL instructors strip the language of unnecessary words to increase a student's ability to comprehend. Command verbs are also easily demonstrated by the teacher and student- sit, walk, write, listen, etc. Command verbs are a good place on which to build additional language. For example, add a time word (Walk tomorrow.), a where phrase (Cook in the kitchen.) or an adverb (Write faster.).

Helping Our Students Write Better

Many of our GED/ABE/ESL students do not understand the importance of **planning and revisions** to good writing. And it is particularly important for you to talk with your student before they begin to write no matter how small the task is. Essay writing requires even more planning and there are several good planning templates available to assist with this. Let me know if you need one.

Many students think that their first writing attempt is the finished product. This behavior is similar to students who are reluctant to go back to the text to find an answer. For various reasons, many of our adult students find going back and revisions to be a sign of weakness, when in fact it's just good learner behavior. Some studies, in fact, indicate that good writers spend up to 50% of writing time on revisions and editing.

Students often are embarrassed to see their writing samples awash in red ink, but you still need to help them understand the importance of editing. Perhaps something other than a red pen is needed to reduce embarrassment. Do urge them to re-write the essay after you have made corrections and discussed with them why you made them. Sometimes the finished product isn't perfect, but the student has a visible record of the changes occurring as they improve their ability to write clearly.
