## WHAT ARE THE COMPONENTS OF READING? April 5, 2010

OUR LAST NEWSLETTERS HAVE ADDRESSED

#### **PHONEMIC AWARENESS:**

AND PHONICS.

Phonemes are the smallest units of sound that make up spoken language. English consists of about 42 phonemes. (Just to accentuate the difficulties our students have, experts disagree as to the exact number of English phonemes that exist!)

Phonemes combine to form syllables and syllables, words. A few words have only one phoneme, such as <u>a</u> (a) or <u>oh</u> (o). Most words consist of a blend of phonemes, such as <u>go</u> (g-o) with two phonemes, <u>check</u> (ch-e-ck) with three phonemes, or <u>stop</u> with four phonemes (s-t-o-p). Phonemic awareness

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

#### TUTOR TIP OF THE MONTH

AN EXERCISE TO GET BEGINNING READERS AND WRITERS STARTED IS TO CREATE A STUDENT LIFE-EVENTS TIMELINE. THE TUTOR CAN MODEL THIS EXERCISE BY DRAWING AND WRITING HIS/HER OWN LIFE TIMELINE. FIRST, GET THE STUDENT TO TALK ABOUT THEIR IDEAS OF SIGNIFICANT

EVENTS IN HIS/HER LIFE. THIS EXERCISE WILL GENERATE SIMPLE, YET PERSONALIZED, TEXT TO INVOLVE THE STUDENT IN READING AND WRITING. THE TIMELINE CAN BE ADDED TO OR REVISITED AS THE STUDENT LEARNS MORE SOPHISTICATED VOCABULARY. YOU COULD ALSO CREATE A TIMELINE OF MILESTONES IN YOUR TUTORING SESSIONS.

IT IS "A JOY" TO SEE HER STUDENT MAKE PROGRESS; CAROLYN'S WORK HAS CONTRIBUTED GREATLY TO THE PROMOTION HER STUDENT ACHIEVED AT WORK.
